SUBJECT:

Second Public Hearing in the redistricting process to begin at 6:30 pm.

RECOMMENDED ACTION:

1. Open the public hearing 6:30 p.m.

- 2. Conduct a public hearing to solicit further public testimony regarding the current districts, communities of interest, and possible changes.
- 3. Receive updated information about the current council districts in light of the newly released, final, prisoner-adjusted Census data.
- 4. Direct the demographic consultants to prepare draft district maps for initial presentation to the Council at the third public hearing to be held on January 19, 2022.

FISCAL CONSIDERATIONS:

The cost of redistricting is estimated to be \$180,000 and has been included in the fiscal year 2021-22 budget.

BACKGROUND:

Following every federal decennial census, local governments that conduct elections using district-based voting are required to commence a formal redistricting process as prescribed by the California Elections Code, based upon that new Census. As a consequence of the Legislature's significant revisions to the FAIR MAPS Act in 2020, Encinitas must follow a somewhat different process and different substantive criteria than those used to establish its current voting districts in 2017. It is therefore necessary for Encinitas to undertake a redistricting effort following the federal 2020 census that uses the specific procedures California law now requires. The Council adopted a timeline and process for the redistricting at its September 22, 2021 meeting.

The City has engaged assistance from Christopher Skinnell, a partner at the law firm of Nielsen Merksamer, and demographers Douglas Johnson and Shannon Kelly from National Demographics Corporation (NDC), to assist with the process.

Redistricting public workshop #2

The second redistricting public workshop took place on Saturday, October 16, 2021 at the Encinitas Community and Senior Center between 10 - 2:00 p.m. City staff and demographer were on site to meet with the public to answer questions, provide information and demonstrate the *DistrictR* mapping tool and Paper Mapping Kits. While public attendance at the prior public hearing and workshops have been light, participation on the City's redistricting website and use of the *DistrictR* mapping tool has produced a lot of activity with 39 draft maps submitted for review. The demographer will begin to evaluate all draft maps based on the substantive criteria and population allocations as outlined in the analysis below. The demographer will present the viable draft maps to City Council at the January 19, 2022 meeting.

ANALYSIS:

Updated demographic analysis

As a result of the COVID-19 pandemic, the Census Bureau released its initial census data in August 2021 rather than its statutory deadline of March 31, 2021. Changes to state law now require cities to base their redistricting on data that has been adjusted by the California Statewide Database which reassigned incarcerated residents back to their last known place of residence. The adjusted data was finally released by the Census Bureau on September 27, 2021. Based on this new state census data, NDC has provided the following demographic analysis of the existing council districts:

Under Supreme Court case law, "total deviation" under 10% is regarded as presumptively compliant with constitutional equal population requirements. Due to recent state law changes, it is necessary for the City as part of the redistricting process to review the existing districts under the following criteria:

Revised district boundaries substantive criteria

As previously presented, California Elections Code Section 21621(c) requires the City Council to adopt district boundaries using the following criteria, in the following order of priority:

- To the extent practicable, council districts shall be geographically contiguous.
- To the extent practicable, the geographic integrity of any local neighborhood or local community of interest shall be respected in a manner that minimizes its division. A "community of interest" is a population that shares common social or economic interests that should be included within a single district for purposed of its effective and fair representation. Communities of interest do not include relationships with political parties, incumbents or political candidates.
- Districts must be easily identifiable and understandable by residents.

- To the extent practicable, districts shall be defined by natural and artificial barriers, by streets or by the boundaries of the city.
- To the extent practicable, boundaries must be drawn to encourage geographical compactness in a manner that nearby areas of population are not bypassed in favor of more distant populations.
- May not adopt district boundaries for the purpose of favoring or discrimination against a political party.

At the September 22, 2021 public hearing, the Council identified the City's five historical neighborhoods, (Old Encinitas, New Encinitas, Olivenhain, Leucadia, and Cardiff-by-the-Sea) as communities of interest to be taken into consideration in this process. This evening's public hearing is to give the Council and the public an additional opportunity to provide any further guidance regarding the current district lines or communities of interest to guide the preparation of draft maps for consideration at future public hearings in accordance with the adopted timeline.

ENVIRONMENTAL CONSIDERATIONS:

The action being considered by the Council is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) because it is not a "project" under Section 15378(b) of CEQA Guidelines. The action involves organizational or administrative activity of government that will not result in the direct or indirect physical change in the environment.



2. California Criteria for Cities

- 1. Geographically contiguous
- 2. Undivided neighborhoods and "communities of interest" (Socio-economic geographic areas that should be kept together)
- 3. Easily identifiable boundaries
- 4. Compact

(Do not bypass one group of people to get to a more distant group of people)

Prohibited:

"Shall not favor or discriminate against a political party."

3. Other Traditional Redistricting Principles

Minimize voters shifted to different election years

Respect voters' choices / continuity in office

Future population growth

Preserving the core of existing districts



Defining Communities of Interest

Under the California Elections Code, "community of interest" has a very specific definition in the context of districting and redistricting cities and counties:

A "community of interest" is a population that shares common social or economic interests <u>that should be included within a single district for purposes of its effective and fair representation</u>.

Communities of interest do not include relationships with political parties, incumbents, or political candidates.

(emphasis added)



Describing your Community of Interest

1st Question: What defines your community?

- Geographic Area, plus
- Shared issue or characteristic
 - Shared social or economic interest.
 - Impacted by county policies
- Tell us "your community's story"

2nd Question: Would this community benefit from being "included within a single district for purposes of its effective and fair representation"?

Or would it benefit more from having multiple representatives?


Definitions of Communities of Interest may <u>not</u> include relationships with political parties, incumbents, or political candidates.
