SUBJECT: AB 2369 (Gonzalez Fletcher): Fishing: marine protected areas: violations *Notice of Support*

Joe Mosca Deputy Mayor On behalf of the City of Encinitas, I am writing in support of Assembly Bill 2369 to create more stringent penalties for commercial and party boat poaching in marine protected areas, or MPAs. The bill will set the appropriate penalties for illegal commercial fishing and harvest in our MPAs, which is as much a crime against our residents as it is against the environment. Under current law, penalties for poaching in an MPA for commercial entities, including commercial passenger fishing vessels or "party boats", are not an effective deterrent.

The City of Encinitas is home to over 12.5 square miles of MPAs that include some of our greatest natural assets. Our beaches, reefs, kelp forests and estuary are critical for endangered and endemic wildlife, birds, fisheries and even mega-fauna like whales and sharks. They are also important for residents and tourists, sustaining some of our biggest economic drivers and providing open space for favorite pastimes like surfing, hiking and diving. Fortunately, many of the city's natural ecosystems are protected as MPAs.

California's MPA network was established to protect and conserve marine life and habitat. Unfortunately, some individuals and entities undermine the protections established by MPAs with illegal poaching. Illegal poaching threatens the delicate balance of marine life inside these MPAs. When violations are committed by commercial entities, the poaching is typically on a much greater scale and thus poses an even greater threat to these ecosystems. Illegal poaching by commercial entities negatively impacts law-abiding businesses and individuals.
