

The pop-up workshops are part of the City of Encinitas Coastal Mobility and Livability Study. The study will examine:

- How people travel within the City;
- What types of changes are needed; and
- How the corridor can be more livable for example, how to quiet train noise and enhance community character.

"Engaging the community is critical to the success of Coastal Mobility and Livability Study. We want to hear from and talk with everyone that is interested in the future of the City," said Manjeet Ranu, acting director of planning.

Public input will be used to inform development of draft concepts, which will be presented for public feedback in another round of workshops in early 2017.
